

	New Perspectives on Nine Mile Canyon and the West Tavaputs Plateau: The 2010 Warrior Ridge Investigations
	Warrior Ridge is one of the most iconic complexes of rock art anywhere in the state of Utah, renowned for its depictions of hundreds of warriors in apparent combat with one another. And it is commonly assumed that it was a defensive refuge in times of conflict. Recent efforts to thoroughly document the 1,000-meter ridge line has revealed more than a dozen pithouses, surface structures and towers along the ridge line and an abundance of small storage facilities. The features are located from 200 to 700 feet above the valley floor. The preliminary evidence suggests that Warrior Ridge might not be defensive, but rather a winter habitation by highly mobile farmers who moved frequently between summer field houses in the canyon bottom and winter seasonal residences at higher elevations.
	Jerry Spangler is the executive director of the Colorado Plateau Archaeological Alliance which is a non-profit organization established to foster the conservation, preservation, and protection of archaeological resources of the greater Colorado Plateau. Mr. Spangler received a Master's degree in Archaeology/Anthropology from Brigham Young University in 1993 with thesis research on the settlement patterns of Nine Mile Canyon. He has published numerous articles on the archaeology of the Colorado Plateau.

	The Beginning was a Long Time Ago
	The human story of northeastern Utah would have significant gaps and important omissions if not for the efforts of USAS members. Dr. Loosle will share examples of Uintah Basin projects and ground breaking research that highlights the rich legacy of avocational and professional collaboration in this archaeologically spectacular corner of the world.
	Dr. Byron Loosle is currently the state archaeologist for the Bureau of Land Management in Utah. For sixteen years, he was the forest archaeologist on the Ashley National Forest. He has hosted a number of volunteer projects that have explored prehistoric occupations in the Uinta Mountains, the Fremont occupation of the Uinta Basin, and the Carter Military Road. He served as the Uinta Basin USAS Chapter advisor and on the Uintah County Preservation Commission for more than a decade. Dr. Loosle received a PhD in Anthropology/Archaeology from the University of Kansas and a Master's degree in Anthropology/Archaeology from Brigham Young University.

GILSONITE DEVELOPMENT& MINING: FINDING WAYS TO MARKET Roland Heath, a mining engineer and past President of our chapter will lead this tour visiting the

ghost towns of Watson and Rainbow where the Uintah Railway track extended along the Gilsonite vein for approximately 5 miles. Lunch stop will be at Bonanza, where current mining is centered, with a tour of the town and mining facilities. Bring sun protection, water & lunch. Vans will be provided for the first 23 passengers - 120 miles round trip on paved and dirt roads. *Easy hiking*.

VERNAL CLASSIC FREMONT ROCK ART: MCKEE SPRINGS & RAINBOW PARK

Located on Dinosaur National Monument, this site is considered to have some of the finest rock art in Utah. One of the central shield figures is a logo for the Monument. Lunch stop is at a shady picnic area next to the Green River. Bring sun protection, bug spray, water and lunch. Dale Gray, a longtime USAS member, will lead the tour. Participants must provide own transportation – 50 miles round trip on paved and dirt roads. *Moderate hiking*.

SATURDAY, JUNE 11 Half Day Tours 8 a.m. – 12- p.m.

VERNAL CLASSIC FREMONT & UTE ROCK ART: DRY FORK CANYON The incredible rock art on this private ranch is always open for self-guided tours. Our tour, lead by Roland Heath, hikes through a section of the ranch onto BLM land. At least 30 sites along ³/₄'s of a mile feature shield figures and Ute Bear Dance panels. McConkie Ranch artifacts will be open for viewing between 11 a.m. – 1 p.m. Bring sun protection, snacks or lunch, and water. Participants

must provide own transportation - 20 miles round trip on paved roads. Moderate hiking.

VERNAL CLASSIC FREMONT ROCK ART: FREESTONE RANCH

This remote ranch, formerly owned by Tom Freestone, one of our chapter's founders, is rarely open to the public. Our Tshirt design is taken from the central panel, where the larger -than -life figures are depicted in bas-relief in the Vernal Classic Fremont style. Other figures can be attributed to Ute and Shoshone cultures. The tour will be led by Jeff Freestone, Tom's son. Bring sun protection, lunch or snacks and water. Participants must provide own transportation - 40 miles round trip on paved & dirt roads. *Easy hiking*.

VERNAL CLASSIC FREMONT ROCK ART & HISTORIC RANCH: CUB CREEK

Dale Gray will lead the tour to these Dinosaur National Monument sites. The Fremont rock art can be accessed by a short hike, or viewed by binoculars from the car. Most are petroglyphs, with a few pictographs as well. One interesting panel features a huge lizard, solidly pecked, 8-10 feet long. Time may permit a visit to Josie's Cabin, homesteaded by a colorful pioneer woman. Participants must provide own transportation - 60 miles round trip on paved & dirt roads. *Moderate hiking*.

VERNAL CLASSIC FREMONT ROCK ART: ASHLEY CREEK

These spectacular sites are rarely viewed, since access is through private land. State President Paul Carroll will lead the tour. A highlight is a large anthropomorph holding a shield about 3 feet in diameter. Part of the walking is on flat ground, but viewing of the best panels will require hiking part way up a steep ridge. Bring sun protection, snacks or lunch and water. Participants must provide own transportation – 10 miles round trip on paved and dirt roads. *Moderate hiking*.
